Our Grandmothers Knew What They Were Doing – Laura Bibler

Laura Bibler has found inspiration for today's gardens from horticultural wisdom handed down from our grandmothers' time. Her presentation will bring to life both the design approach and the sage advice of prominent garden writers of the early 20th Century. Their pearls of wisdom continue to inform us on color blending, cultural considerations and plant placement. Truly, our grandmothers knew what they were doing!

March Meeting

Rethinking Uses for Annuals – Sally Muspratt

Sally Muspratt delivered a funny and informative program called "Rethinking Uses for Annuals." Sally suggested that garden club members <u>not</u> use predesigned annual arrangements sold by companies like Proven Winners and instead rely on our own creativity. Designing your own arrangements for containers or window boxes is less expensive, more fun, and often creates more interesting arrangements.

Sally also recommended considering annuals instead of perennials for a number of situations. One is for areas that are used for plowing piles of snow where perennials would be crushed and damaged by salt and sand. Another is for a new garden when the owner is not sure what colors or design to use. The owner can experiment using annuals, which are less expensive, to determine what colors work and where perennials might go in the future.

One of the most refreshing parts of her talk was her description of the terrible mistakes she had made in designing a garden for her ancestral home in Quebec. She said took four tries before she found that planting a garden of annuals was the best solution for that garden. It was very reassuring to hear such an experienced and skilled profession talk about her own failures.
