
Scholarships

In 2018, the Natick Conservation Commission set a goal to restore an overgrown area of the Town Forest that had once been a neighborhood recreational field. James will share the project's background, invasives mitigation, plans and progress toward transforming this 2-acre site into an open vista of diverse native grasses and forbs that will offer a welcome contrast to the surrounding forest while providing food, nectar and habitat for insects, birds and small mammals.

November 9, 2023

Trevor Smith – Garden Design

Trevor Smith is Weston Nurseries' Design and Education Manager. His passion for the natural world inspires his commitment to ecological principles and practices and he is devoted to creating beautiful landscapes as an oasis to reconnect with the natural world. Trevor specializes in green storm water infrastructure, such as permeable pavers and rain gardens, as well as in landscapes designed to maximize Earth's systems while balancing them with the needs and desires of her human inhabitants.

December 21, 2023

Gretel Anspach-Seed Saving

Gretel will speak about the reasons for saving your own seeds and teach us some of the basic techniques for ensuring genetic purity. They will discuss home garden plants from which seeds can be easily saved and stored for future use. Gretel established and maintains a 20,000 square foot food production garden that has provided fresh produce to the Marlboro and Maynard Food Pantries for the last ten years. Their primary interest and focus is always in the science behind horticulture.

Tovah Martin – Easiest Houseplants Ever with Style

Native Plant of the Month

White Wood Aster, Eurybia divaricata

As we move into the autumn months, asters take center stage in the garden. One aster that fits the bill as a ground cover is white wood aster, a hardy and easy to grow wild flower that serves an important role for native wildlife.

Eurybia divaricata — commonly known as white wood aster, white heart-leaved aster, and woodland aster — is native to dry open woods in the Eastern United States. It has a mounding habit, reaching up to about two feet high, with prolific flowers that begin in



late summer and extend into fall. The plants spread by rhizomes and can cover a large area in a few years.

White wood aster features delicate white, daisy-like flowers with yellow centers that change to red after pollination. Dark colored stems and deep green, heart-shaped leaves look attractive all season. Plants can adapt to part shade or shade, dry or moist soils, and are both deer and drought tolerant. White wood aster is somewhat susceptible to powdery mildew so it benefits from good air circulation and some morning sun.





The flowers of white wood aster are a favorite of bees and butterflies, and the plant hosts the pearl crescent (*Phyciodes tharos*, pictured right) and checkerspot butterflies. When most plants have stopped flowering, white wood aster provides an important food source for these and other pollinators. Seeds that follow the flowers offer an important food source for birds and small mammals.
