
The chairs of the following committees are planning to step down, or are requesting an additional team member. The current committee chairs will be happy to help you understand what is involved and assist with the transition.

Preparing the Soil for Gardening: The quality and make-up of your soil has a huge influence on how well your plants will do. Unlike sunlight, air, and water (the other 3 requirements), you can't tell whether your soils are right for your plants by looking at your soil or even by looking at your plants. Learn about soil structure, compaction, fertility, and pH, and learn how you can modify these qualities for a more successful garden.

Gretel Anspach is a Trustee of the Massachusetts Horticultural Society, a Lifetime Master Gardener with the Massachusetts Master Gardener Association, and a recently-retired systems engineer for Raytheon. She won the MMGA Lifetime Achievement Award in 2016. Gretel established and maintains a 20,000 square foot food production garden that has provided fresh produce to the Marlboro and Maynard Food Pantries for the last ten years. Her primary interest and focus is always in the science behind horticulture.

How we are keeping busy...

Marilyn Lustig is caring for her granddaughter, and has kept a monthly personal newsletter (hardcopy) that she mails to her daughter. Marilyn tells us "It's a creative outlet for me & a great communication with my far away daughter, filled with things I've read, seen & heard. I also draw pictures or copy pictures. It's a journal between the 2 of us. I got the idea from an article in the New York Times & that person made copies that she sent to all family & friends. Mine is personalized to just the one child but very fulfilling for both of us."

Elizabeth Vincent Owen sent this description of her garden and tool maintenance efforts: "I have treated my tools. I painted the handles of small hand tools a bright color so I can find them if I happen to leave them in the garden, then then polished them with beeswax or clear wax. This will last most of the summer, depending on how much the tool is used. My shovel handle is especially important to me. Every year I fill any small gaps with wood filler, sand and cover it with boiled linseed oil. This year I'm going to use beeswax on top of that too. It has been fine with just the boiled linseed oil. I'm just experimenting this year. I also treated my stirrup hoe (if that's the right name) in the same manner.

I have some old logs that I am hoping to use in a way to tame the raspberry "forest". I have treated the logs with polyurethane and will let you know if the project progresses and if it's successful. Also, I planted some daffodils Saturday and we'll see how they do.


Pat Collins reports that she's sorting and discarding old papers, and can't wait for spring!
