Our Grandmothers Knew What They Were Doing – Laura Bibler

Laura Bibler gave an interesting historical lecture entitled "Our Grandmothers Knew What They Were Doing." Laura studied three garden writers from the early 1900s and found many of their recommendations hold true for today. Their flower suggestions include many that are familiar to us today: peonies, roses, dahlias, and bee balm among others. Their thoughts on color blending, cultural consideration and plant placement form the basis of what we do today.

- The Little Garden by Mrs. Francis King (1924)
- Color in My Garden by Louise Beebe Wilder (1918)
