Plant Sale Volunteers are Needed!

Our Plant Auction/sale has typically been a time that the WHOLE club community pitches in to pull off the sale!

Volunteers are needed on plant pick up days to help Bryan and Catherine organize plants for pickup and delivery. Additional volunteers will be needed to make the deliveries, times and dates TBD as orders come in. Deliveries may be on other days (not necessarily Wednesdays and Saturdays), as arranged with the buyers and available volunteers.

Email both Bryan and Catherine using <u>INFO@NATICKGARDENCLUB.ORG</u> to sign up for a pick-up date or to volunteer to do deliveries!

Here's the schedule:

On-line store will open for sales on Saturday 5/22 and we are offering delivery within 5 miles of Natick Center

Plants may be picked up (address to be provided when sale is confirmed) the following times

Wednesdays beginning 5/26, 4:00 to 7:00 pm

Saturdays beginning 5/29, 9:00 am to 1:00 pm

Special extra pick-up on Friday 5/28 - time TBD

Plant Sale Plants are Needed! Dig! Dig! Dig!

To donate plants for the sale, follow these easy steps:

- Dig early and often give the plants time to become acclimated to their pots. Try to dig at least a week before they are to be sold.
- · Make sure the plant has a substantial root system.
- Plant in a pot (not a box or paper bag.) A milk carton, yogurt tub, or other plastic food holder will work. If you need pots, call or text Bryan at 617-910-7383. Let us know what size pot(s) and how many you need. If you have extra pots, we can always use them.
- Amend the soil if your garden soil is poor. You can lighten large pots and reduce the use of soil with leaves at the bottom of the pot. Pots do not need to be full so long as the roots are covered.
- Remove hitchhiking bugs and/or weeds.

- Remove dead or tattered leaves and stake if necessary.
- Do NOT donate invasive plants no matter how appealing. (ex: NO orange daylilies!)
- Gather as much information as possible: name (common and scientific if you know it), bloom time, color, height, light and moisture requirements and type (perennial/biennial/annual.) Note if it is a rapid spreader or enthusiastic self-seeder
- Get a photo of the plant in bloom if you can, but do NOT "borrow" a photo from another source.

Email your plant donation details (and photos if available) to donateplants@natickgardenclub.org. At this point in time it's helpful to know how many of something you have potted; if you have a large number you may inquire how many we need.

You will get an email back with an Item Number for each plant (multiples of the same plant will have the same number). You will need to put this number clearly and well secured (written on or stapled to the pot would be great) on each plant and leave the plants in a safe, but accessible location. Then you will need to reply to the email that gave you your item number(s) to tell us where the plants are located. Plan on watering the plants for a while - we will let you know when the plants need to be delivered or will be picked up.

With everyone's participation, we can make 2021 as successful as past years. Looking forward to wide-ranging participation from the club. Happy Digging!


